#### *INTRODUCTION*

We are pleased to submit, the annual report for the City of Bryan Fire Department for 2023. The information presented here are the activities performed by the Fire Department this past year.

The Fire Department is responsible for providing fire suppression, emergency medical care, rescue, special operations and related services to the public. The mission of the Fire Department is in the following statement:

The City of Bryan Fire Department is dedicated to providing the highest level of emergency services to the residents and visitors of our community. The Department protects lives and properties through fire suppression, fire prevention, public education, response to natural and man-made disasters and the rescue of trapped, lost or injured persons. The City of Bryan Fire Department is dedicated to assisting, to the best of our ability, other governmental agencies in the completion of their mission.

#### **Our Vision**

The City of Bryan Fire Department seeks to be a respected and productive organization in the City and surrounding communities, by providing the most professionally trained and experienced personnel with the necessary apparatus and equipment to complete our mission in an efficient and effective manner.

#### **Core Values**

**Service:** Service to the public is a noble and responsible calling. Our members consider it a privilege to serve the citizens and visitors of the City of Bryan and outlying communities.


Thanks to Mayor Schlade, City Council, all the members of the Fire Department, and the Citizens of our great City for their continued efforts and support to make our Fire Department the best in Northwest Ohio.



The City of Bryan Fire Department provides services 24 hours a day 365 days a year through our combination Fire Department. The Department currently employs a Career staff of Fire Chief, Assistant Fire Chief, Captain, and six Fulltime Firefighters. The Department currently has 22 Paid-on-Call / Part-time Firefighters and our Volunteer Chaplain totaling 32 members. Personnel staff the station 24 hours a day seven days a week with a minimum staff of one with 1 fire officer assigned to respond. Part-time staffing is from 7AM to 7PM. All available personnel are called for general alarm responses.

In 2023, The City of Bryan Fire Department responded to 1251 calls for service, a 261% increase from 2022. The increase in call volume is attributed to additional calls for EMS First Responders beginning at the end of May when response protocols were changed. Earlier notification has improved the service to the public.



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


Assisting our neighboring communities is an important aspect of the Fire Department. As we have seen, no Fire Department has all of the necessary resources to handle many of our calls for service. Through Automatic Aid and Mutual Aid, we are able to help and receive help from our neighbors to meet their mission and ours. Last year our Firefighters were dispatched 9 times for automatic aid and 9 times for mutual aid with neighboring departments. The Fire Department received help from neighboring departments 11 times for automatic aid.



In 2023, the average time for the first fire apparatus to arrive at all emergency calls for service decreased 2 minutes or more from 2022. Much of the improved response time is a result of having staff on station. The average time spent on an individual call in 2023 was twenty-seven minutes. This is a reduction of 12 minutes from 2022. The Fire Department is always striving to improve as we provide service to our community. The Fire Department's aim is to improve our service level and ensure that our responses meet the needs of the community. We accomplish this by continually reviewing current operations, training needs, operational planning, confirming automatic mutual aid and continued development of our combination department.



## **FIRES**

The Fire Department responded to 14 residential fires 10 other structural fires in 2023. During 2022, 9 vehicle fires were reported and 26 other outside fires. Forty-seven (47) were fires reported in 2023. Our dollar loss in property and contents totaled an estimated \$260459.00. This accounts for 3.1% of the total estimated property value involved. Firefighters saved an estimated \$8,212,366.00 in involved property last year or 96.9%. One civilian and two firefighters were injured at fires in 2023.







#### FIRE PREVENTION

Our Fire Prevention Section has multiple responsibilities within the Fire Department accomplished through public education, building plan review, and code enforcement. The Fire Department works in conjunction with the Engineering Department and Bryan Municipal Utilities to ensure that new construction meets the minimum fire safety requirements. Existing commercial, industrial, and educational facilities are inspected on a regular basis. Home inspections are also conducted if requested by the homeowner. Last year 56 fire inspections were completed. As a delegated authority for underground storage tanks, the Fire Prevention Section witnesses installation and repairs to ensure compliance.

Fire Safety programs are an important part of Fire Prevention. Fire Department Personnel trained as Life Safety Educators develop and deliver programs to different groups in the community including schools, businesses, industry, community groups, and neighborhood associations. Each tailored to the specific audience. Last year, extinguisher training, CPR and education programs delivered in our community reached more than 2000 adults and children.





#### **TRAINING**

Our Training section provides training not only to our firefighters but also through our training academy to area fire departments and firefighters. Training of Fire Department members is probably one of the most important aspects of the Fire Department. Fire Department personnel are required to maintain their professional licensures through continuing education. We are always providing ongoing and comprehensive training topics that enhance our Firefighter's knowledge and give them the tools and resources that they need to be prepared for our multifaceted environment.





With the long awaited completion of our live burn training facility, we are once again able to provide all Bryan Fire Training Academy courses at our training grounds

## **UNMANNED AIRCRAFT ACTIVITIES**

Our Mavic Pro UAS was utilized for this year to assist with planning and observation of events at Day in the Park and GNT concert. Indoor flights at Career Day provided demonstrations of the technology in use by our department. Several missions were flown to assist other agencies. We assisted Bryan Police with search for a subject. Two missions were flow during mutual aid responses for field fires and one HazMat response at a large fire.

Currently four certified UAS pilots are on staff. The Mavic is equipped for night flights, but does not have thermal imaging capabilities. Recorded flight hours for 2023 was 1 hour and 24 minutes. A total of 23.4 hours are on the aircraft.







#### **APPARATUS**

A list of apparatus is below. While the newest engines are less than 25 years old, the third due and reserve engine are 40+. Tower 27 will be 30 years old this year. It is currently waiting for a communications cable to be manufactured for repair work. Rescue 25 on board generator has had major repairs over the last 2 years. The generator is currently not running. Availability of parts for older apparatus is becoming very difficult. Cost of apparatus has increased dramatically. The expected replacement cost of a Pumper is \$800,000. The Ladder is estimated at \$2,000,000. The lead-time on new fire trucks is 2 to 3 years from order. The replacement of fire apparatus is becoming a higher priority.
