Police In-Service Training

- Contract with Owens Community College for a very reasonable cost to the Department
- BPD officers received over 1,300 hours of training in various topics, including Ethics, Arrest, Search, and Seizure, Trauma and Wellness, Domestic Violence, Vehicle Dynamics, Report Writing, and Leadership.
- The Department now has three (3) OPOTA-certified Instructors
- Hosted several local trainings, including Basic SWAT and Active Shooter Response

Police Fleet

Our fuel consumption was up from 2024, using 1,250 more gallons due to staffing levels being full. Our maintenance cost was also up, just over \$100.



Alcohol Breath Test

A new Intoxilyzer DMT alcohol testing machine was received in April and was paid for by all Williams County Law Enforcement agencies and housed at our department.

A total of 48 subject tests were conducted on the new machine, 27 by Bryan Police officers. There were an additional three (3) subjects arrested for OVI, but tested using other methods. There was an increase of 25% in arrests for OVI from the previous year.



K9 Unit

K9 Tyson and his handler, Patrolman Matthew Sammons, left the Bryan Police Department in early December. The City agreed to let Patrolman Sammons buy Tyson due to his age. K9 Bane and his handler, Patrolman Brian Robinson, continue to prove valuable assets to the Bryan Police Department as well.

Multi-Area Narcotics Unit


Detective John Rathke continued to be successful in fighting the drug epidemic that has affected the City of Bryan and Williams County. The participating agencies are committed to the safety of our community and strive for a drug-free atmosphere for our citizens.

Williams County handled 54 of the 249 cases through the MAN Unit. Detective Rathke was involved in 108 cases between the City of Bryan and other agencies. Williams County conducted 29 search warrants, which included consent to search, device search, and trash pulls. There were 6 overdose cases in Williams County, 50 overall, which resulted in 6 deaths.


There were a total of 180 indictments, 66 being in Williams County, resulting in the following charges:
